One of seven strategic sites in City Region Deal



Site Context

140-hectare site; 200 ha of protected green space to West

Numerous masterplans and owners over last 20 years

Over 60 hectares of contaminated land; made ground and steep topography

2008: market failure, private sector investment halted

Piecemeal development; poor sense of place

Surrounding neighbourhoods within top 5% areas of deprivation (SIMD)

Former industrial; rich history and heritage but neglected

Strong public sector partnership and vision


Accelerate the delivery of net zero homes on brownfield sites to meet Edinburgh and the City Region's housing need. Alongside enterprise, learning and culture space.



Phase 1 Masterplan




Phase 1 Proposed Site Plan, May 2024



- 847 net zero homes in a mix of housing types and tenure of which 45% will be of affordable tenure,
- Approximately 2,250 sq m of commercial
- A low carbon heat network serving the new development and existing buildings within the area, known as Project 1,
- Placemaking including high quality landscaping and public realm, and
- Sustainable transport infrastructure including a mobility hub



Baseline situation

- 28,000 people living there in 2019 compared to 21,000 in 2004.
- 42% of people in the North West have not engaged in any exercise
- second highest rate of city child poverty at 34%
- highest percentage of under 16s compared to other city localities
- second lowest average household income in Edinburgh
- 26% of city economically inactive
- highest concentrations of benefits dependency in the city
- NW highest population of older people, & people with dementia

- National Priorities National ambitions for change and strategic fit with the locality

Measurement approach


- 1. Improvement: evidence of improvements on the baseline
